1. Confirm the Integrity of Game Files

1. Open the Steam customer and browse to your **Library**.
2. Right-click on **Counter-Strike: Global Offensive** and choose **Properties**.
3. Go to the **Installed Files** tab (or **Local Files** in older Steam UI).
4. Click **Verify stability of video game files**.
5. Wait on Steam to scan and re-download any missing or corrupted files, then release the video game.

2. Update Graphics Drivers

Outdated or corrupted GPU motorists are a main driver for game crashes, visual artifacts, and "DirectX has come across an unrecoverable mistake" triggers.

- **NVIDIA Users:** Download the GeForce Experience app or go to the NVIDIA website to set up the most recent Game Ready Driver.
- **AMD Users:** Use the AMD Software: Adrenalin Edition to look for updates.

Pro-tip: If crashes persist after an upgrade, use a free tool like **DDU (Display Driver Uninstaller)** in Safe Mode to completely clean your old chauffeurs before setting up fresh ones.

3. Clean Up Launch Options

Launch alternatives can considerably modify how CS: GO uses your hardware. However, older commands typically contravene modern Windows updates.



Follow these actions to reset your launch choices:

1. Open Steam Library -> > Right-click **CS: GO** -> > **Properties**.
2. Under the **General** tab, locate the **Launch Options** text box.
3. Clear whatever out, or trial run the game with a blank slate.

- -high (typically causes stuttering on contemporary Windows 10/11 builds)
- -nod3d9ex (dated)

4. Disable Overlays and Background Applications

- **Discord Overlay:** Go to User Settings > > App Settings > > Overlay > > Toggle "In-game overlay" off.
- **Steam Overlay:** Steam Settings > > In-Game > > Uncheck "Enable the Steam Overlay while in-game."
- **NVIDIA GeForce Experience Overlay:** Open GeForce Experience > > Settings > > General > Toggle off "In-Game Overlay."
- **Third-party software application:** MSI Afterburner, RivaTuner Statistics Server (RTSS), and Razer Cortex can periodically contravene the Source engine.

Advanced Solutions for Persistent Crashes

If the fundamental steps haven't dealt with the concern, it's time to look much deeper into your operating system and hardware setup.

Run an SFC Scan (System File Checker)

Corrupted Windows system files can interfere with DirectX and other APIs required by CS: GO.

1. Press the Windows Key, type cmd.
2. Right-click **Command Prompt** and select **Run as administrator**.
3. Type sfc/ scannow and press Enter.
4. Let the scan complete, restart your PC, and check the video game.

Change Virtual Memory (Pagefile)

Running out of RAM or Virtual Memory can cause sudden crashes mid-game. Making sure Windows handles your pagefile automatically can prevent this:

1. Press the Windows Key, type **Advanced system settings**, and open it.
2. Under the **Advanced** tab, click **Settings** under the Performance section.
3. Go to the **Advanced** tab once again and click **Change** under Virtual memory.
4. Ensure **Automatically manage paging file size for all drives** is inspected.

Test for Hardware Instability

If your CPU or RAM is aggressively overclocked (through XMP/EXPO or manual tweaks), the Source engine can be infamously delicate to instability.

- Momentarily disable XMP/DOCP in your BIOS to see if crashes stop.
- Run a tension test program like Prime95 or MemTest86 to look for faulty hardware parts.

Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ)

Q: Why does CS: GO crash particularly when loading a map?A: Map packing crashes are almost always connected to missing, damaged, or out-of-date map files. Verifying your video game cache through Steam or unsubscribing from troublesome Workshop maps normally fixes this quickly.

Q: What should I do if my whole PC freezes (Hard Lock) needing a manual reboot?A: A complete system freeze generally points toward a hardware problem-- most commonly GPU instability, getting too hot, or a failing power supply. Inspect your temperature levels utilizing software application like HWMonitor and ensure your graphics card motorists are completely current.
