

Why ants keep showing up in Scarborough kitchens

If you are dealing with kitchen ants, the starting point is understanding why they keep returning. In many homes, an **ant infestation** starts because ants find easy access to **sugar sources**, moisture, and shelter. In Scarborough, that can happen in detached homes, townhomes, and high-rise condos alike, but the paths they take may differ based on the **property type**.
