

Rockville has always had a practical streak. The city's history is written not only in courthouse records and preserved landmarks, but also in the ordinary structures people rely on every day: front porches, row homes, older detached houses, newer subdivisions, and garages that have been opened and shut thousands of times without much thought. If you live here long enough, you start to notice how the built environment tells the story of the place. Simple maintenance also helps preserve the parts that wear the fastest. Springs and cables should not be treated as if they can be ignored indefinitely. A little silicone-based lubrication on moving metal parts can reduce friction. Weather seals should be checked for cracks and gaps, especially before winter. If the opener is old and the remotes are erratic, the issue may be electrical, but age still matters.
